

All the Light We Cannot See

Anthony Doerr

A luminous, lyrical wartime novel that follows a blind French girl and a German boy whose paths slowly draw together. It is gentle in spirit even as it sits with hard history.

Reading level: Moderate

Best for: Clubs who love beautiful prose, slow-burn stories, and long conversations over second helpings

Discussion

WARM-UP

1. Where did you most love curling up to read this one, and did you have a warm drink in hand?
2. Was there a sentence or small moment that made you stop, smile, and reread it just because it felt good?

DIGGING IN

1. Marie-Laure experiences the world through touch, sound, and smell. What sense did the book wake up in you while you were reading?
2. Radios and broadcasts carry comfort across the dark in this story. What voice, song, or sound has felt like company to you in a lonely stretch of life?
3. The seaside town of Saint-Malo becomes a kind of character. Is there a place you carry inside you the way Marie-Laure carries her models of home?
4. So many small kindnesses ripple through this book. Which gentle gesture between characters warmed you most, and did it remind you of anyone in your own life?




GOING DEEP

1. Werner and Marie-Laure are both pulled along by forces much bigger than themselves. When you closed the book, what feeling sat with you about how they each tried to stay good?
2. The title hints at light we cannot see. By the end, what kind of unseen light do you feel the book was really talking about, and did any of it shine into your own week?

On the table

-  **Buttery potato and leek soup with crusty bread**
A humble French country supper that feels like a hug, fitting for Saint-Malo evenings
-  **Warm cheese and herb gougères**
Cozy little French puffs, easy to pass around the couch during chapters of conversation
-  **Apple tarte tatin with softly whipped cream**
Rustic, caramelized, and comforting, echoing the slow sweetness woven through the story

To sip

-  **Honey and chamomile tea (no alcohol)**
Gentle, soothing, and perfect for a quiet night of feelings and reflection
-  **Spiced hot chocolate with a curl of orange peel (no alcohol)**
Rich and a little indulgent, like a small light in a dark hour
-  **Mulled red wine with cinnamon and clove**
Warm, fragrant, and old-world, nodding to a French wartime kitchen

Run of show

- 7:00** **Soft landing**
Greet guests with slippers-welcome energy, tea on the stove, and the playlist already humming
- 7:15** **Soup and settle**
Ladle the potato leek soup and let everyone get comfy before any real talk
- 7:35** **Warm-up questions**
Pass the question cards and start with the cozy reading-spot prompt to loosen the room
- 8:00** **Heart of the conversation**
Move into the theme and deep questions between bites of gougères
- 8:45** **Tarte and trivia**
Bring out dessert and play a relaxed round of trivia, no scorekeeping pressure
- 9:15** **Scorecards and goodnights**
Fill in scorecards together, share final feelings, send everyone home with a bookmark

HOST TIPS

- Light candles or string lights and keep overhead lighting low so the room feels like a refuge
- Have blankets within reach so guests can literally settle in
- Let silences breathe. This book invites quiet, and cozy nights do not need to fill every pause
